

# **CSME FREE MOVEMENT OF LABOUR GUARANTEE: CONTINGENT RIGHTS**

The social rights of select CARICOM Nationals residing and working in Barbados, Grenada, Haiti, Jamaica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines and Suriname are secure. This is as a result of the recently signed Protocol at the 39th CARICOM Heads of Government Meeting in Jamaica.

This protocol allows the families of CARICOM Temporary Service Providers and CARICOM Nationals moving Capital or establishing businesses and residing in any of the 7 aforementioned states, the ability to access the social services of the host country on the same basis as the host country's nationals.

The penultimate Article 239 of the 2001 Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas establishing the CARICOM including the CSME (RTC) mandated **CARICOM Member States** to develop a Protocol on Rights Contingent on establishment, provision of services and movement of capital in the Community. Some 17 years later, after the creation of the RTC and 12 years after the launch of the CSM, 7 out of 13 CSME participating states signed.

The Protocol is yet to be made public but it is hoped that CARICOM Heads of Government have corrected the grave error of Article 239 and included CARICOM Skilled Nationals.

## **CLIMATE CHANGE & CARICOM FOOD SECURITY**

The Caribbean's small size and vulnerability to natural disasters are important considerations in assessing its state of food security and the effects of climate change on agriculture in the region.

According to a 2017 UNESCO Media According to a 2017 UNESCO Media Release, as part of the Caribbean strategy to mitigate this threat, the CARICOM established the Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre to coordinate the region's response to climate change and to increase resilience to its impact. Furthermore, individual Caribbean countries have started to take action, including Guyana, which is promoting forest conservation; Barbados, which is promoting renewable energy; and St. Lucia, which is incorporating climate change into its sustainable development agenda.

That being said, the region still has a long way to go in developing its strategy to counter the effects of climate change. For agriculture in particular, there must be increased use of technologies to minimize weather dependent agriculture. As shared by CARICOM Today - the official blog of CARICOM - these and other combined actions are critical if the region is to actions are critical if the region is to minimize the impact of climate change on its economies-particular its impact on agriculture and food security.
