ANTIGUA & BARBUDA

May 5, 2020: 25 confirmed COVID-19 cases; 3 deaths

| <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A retrofitted isolation and quarantine centre is being prepared at the Margetson ward, Holberton Hospital. The ward will be equipped to handle any outbreak of the COVID19 here in Antigua and Barbuda, including quarantining, isolation, treatment and laboratory testing. In Barbuda, an isolation room has also been identified at the Hanna Thomas Hospital. On March 9, 2020 it was reported that the work on these centres was nearing completion. Following a request from the government to help the country enhance its COVID-19 response, the healthcare human resource capacity was increased with an additional 31 healthcare workers from Cuba. They included 6 doctors and 25 nurses. Antigua and Barbuda will no longer have to rely solely on the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) to test persons who are suspected to have the virus since the Covid-19 testing equipment are now here on island. 1,500 testing kits have been provided by the People's Republic of China, and 500 of a donation of 1,000 have also arrived, with others on the way. Within the UNDP COVID-19 response plan, the UNDP has committed to supporting the following initiatives for Antigua and Barbuda, which are ongoing or about to be implemented. | *The previously imposed 24-hour curfew from April 2 to April 9 has been extended. The 24-hour curfew has now been enacted from Thursday, April 23rd – 12:01 am to Thursday, May 14, 2020 – 12 Midnight. The curfew window is from 6:00 am until 6:00 pm for essential services, continuing until Friday, May 15, 2020 or for the next 23 days. | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Barbados ‘Best-dos Santos Public Health Laboratory’ became one of the first in the Caribbean to acquire test kits and reagents for COVID-19 detection, with concurrent training of laboratory personnel in the new testing protocol. The provision of COVID-19 test kits and training were made possible by PAHO Health Emergencies Department. • The government of Barbados has identified the old naval base facility at Harrison Point in St Lucy to be used as a quarantine and isolation facility for anyone affected by the COVID-19 virus. This refurbishment of centre has been completed. There are also other quarantine facilities including the District Hospital in St Lucy, the field hospital at the Garrison in St Michael and at Paragon in Christ Church. • A medical team of 100 Cubans arrived in Barbados on April 5, to aid in the COVID-19 fight. • The Government of Barbados has purchased 20,000 COVID-19 test kits from the Cayman Islands to increase its stock of the medical supplies, and also has 50,000 kits coming through PAHO. • *The United States has quickly mobilized US\$6 million to provide test kits to Barbados and more than 60 other countries to fight the spread of COVID-19. Each test kit contains supplies for 2,000 testing samples, including non-consumable equipment that can be used to conduct additional testing. This emergency assistance is part of an International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) response to requests for support in controlling an increasing number of infections worldwide. • *On April 24, 2020 The Ministry of Health in Barbados revised its criteria for persons being referred for COVID-19 testing. The new guidelines were set to expand testing across the island. It is anticipated that “scaled up” testing will improve case detection for earlier diagnosis and containment of the viral illness. • *Within the UNDP COVID-19 response plan, the UNDP has committed to supporting the following initiatives for Barbados, which are ongoing or about to start implementation. | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Central Bank of Barbados (CBB) announced a series of measures (effective April 1, 2020) to help support commercial banks and other deposit-taking institution manage the economic fallout from the coronavirus shock. Specifically: i) the Bank’s discount rate at which it provides overnight lending to banks and deposit-taking non-banks licensed under the Financial Institutions Act was reduced from 7 percent to 2 percent; ii) the securities ratio for banks was lowered from 17.5 percent to 5 percent; iii) the 1.5 percent securities ratio for non-bank deposit taking licensees was eliminated; and, iv) the Bank indicated it stands ready to make collateralized loans for up to six months as liquidity support for licensees. These measures follow an agreement brokered by the Government of Barbados for commercial banks to provide forbearance in the form a 6-month debt-payment moratorium for individuals and business directly impacted by COVID-19. The IDB has moved swiftly to make crucial budgetary support (US\$80 million policy-based loan) available for the Government of Barbados as the country continues to contain to spread of COVID-19 *Within the UNDP COVID-19 response plan, the UNDP has committed to supporting the following initiatives for Barbados, which are ongoing or about to be implemented: supporting MSME retooling and capacity building and a socio-economic impact assessment. *Barbados seeks IMF funding to inject \$150M to fight coronavirus. Unemployment benefits – Those who are laid off fully will receive unemployment benefits for six months and those on short weeks will receive 60 percent for the days they are not working.

“Homes for All” Program – The government is to use BBD 50 million in the Housing Credit Fund to unlock a further BBD 200 million of financing from the banks to help over 1,000 households construct and own an affordable home. The project is expected to start in three months and is initially targeted at persons with a household income of BBD 4,000 per month.

Household Survival Program – A Household Survival Program (injecting BBD 20 million) will be implemented consisting of three initiatives to assist displaced workers. Those being laid off are entitled to unemployment benefits.

Welfare Support – Where, as a result of COVID-19, a household is left with no person employed, the government will provide a minimum income for those households and make available through the Welfare Department an amount up to \$600 per month during this period of hardship.

Adopt-a-Family Program – The government is working with persons who have been fortunate to be earning more than BBD 100,000 a year to “adopt” a vulnerable family and provide them with very much needed support of BBD 600 per month or to contribute to an Adopt-a-family fund chaired by the Director of Finance.

NIS Deferral – Employers who are retaining more than [three quarters/two-thirds] of their staff complement will be able to defer the employer’s contributions to the NIS for the next three months in the first instance, with another three months if necessary.

***Fast tracking** - Several government capital projects already funded by the Caribbean Development Bank are to be fast tracked. These include: (i) the \$6.5 million, Speights town Flood Mitigation Project; (ii) the \$10.2 million Constitution River Flood Mitigation Project, and (iii) the Fairchild Street, rehabilitation project (\$4.6 million). Additionally, much needed repairs on selected government buildings are to be carried out at a cost of \$20 million; as well as repairs to the Industrial Development Complex buildings which house mechanics and entrepreneurs at a cost of \$10 million.

***Support and facilitate the Barbados National Oil Company Limited (BNOCL) and Barbados Light and Power Company Limited (BL&P)** – The government is to support both entities in engaging in a hedging exercise to lock in the currently low oil price for a period of up to two years.

***Bank Financing** - All banks have agreed to provide temporary working-capital financing options for corporate and small businesses directly impacted by COVID.

May 5, 2020: 18 confirmed COVID-19 cases; 2 deaths

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| <p>Prime Minister Dean Barrow has announced the formation of a COVID 19 National Task Force and Oversight Committee to tackle the containment of the deadly virus. The Oversight Committee is co-chaired by the Prime Minister and Leader of the Opposition, with representation from the social partners and business community. | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • During February PAHO experts travelled to Belize and other Caribbean countries to prepare and train staff for COVID-19 testing. • On March 25, a team of 60 Cuban doctors arrived in Belize to help with the national response against the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. • Belize has so far received 2,500 tests from the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) and is expecting an additional 11,500 tests from the organization. Additionally, Belize ordered 4,000 tests from the Roche Agency in Guatemala, 2,000 of which are to be delivered this week and the remaining next week. The Office of the Prime Minister is, therefore, determining in consultation with the Ministry of Health, how many Cayman test kits to procure, and will place its order as soon as the 11,500 tests from PAHO are in hand. • On April 9th Taiwan added to its March 25th contribution an additional BZ\$2 million to contain the spread of COVID-19 in Belize. This is for urgently needed additional personal protective equipment, medical equipment, testing kits, and laboratory supplies for frontline medical service providers countrywide. | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Belize has announced fiscal stimulus amounting to BZ\$25 million (about 1 percent of GDP) in 2020, funded by the central bank and partly through reallocating resources within the budget. DOMINICA

May 5, 2020: 16 confirmed COVID-19 cases; 0 deaths

amount activated, US\$5.1 million will be used to bolster the capacity of Dominica's public health system to manage COVID-19. Funds will be available to purchase drugs, medical supplies and equipment, and laboratory supplies to boost testing capacity and for minor retrofitting of isolation units. Another US\$1.5 million will be used to support agriculture and strengthen national food security during the pandemic. The intervention is targeted to reach an estimated 3,200 farmers to ensure that the local food supply chains are able to better meet the islands' needs.

- *****To mitigate the socio-economic impact authorities announced income transfers to the most vulnerable segments and tax relief programs for households and businesses, including: (i) a waiver for penalties for non-filing of 2019 tax returns and extension of the deadline to June 30 2020 (from March 31); (ii) a waiver of VAT on electricity to Domestic customers, hotels and guest houses for the period April-July 2020; and (iii) reduction of landing taxes to incentivize tourism post containment of Covid-19.
- *****Within the UNDP COVID-19 response plan, the UNDP has committed to supporting the following initiatives for Dominica, which are ongoing or about to be implemented: policy advice and surge support for implementation and a socio-economic impact assessment.
- *****The Ministry of Education is working with Internet service providers to address connectivity issues in communities with no Internet access and learning packs with activity sheets and past papers have been prepared for distribution to students with no Internet access or devices. Recorded class sessions will soon be broadcast via the Government Information System network.
- *****The country's COVID 19 National Food Security Mitigation and Response Plan was explained in detail by Minister for Blue and Green Economy, Agriculture and National Food Security, Honourable Fidel Grant. The Minister stressed that there is an adequate supply of food on island for the next 6 months. Forecasts for marketable yields for bananas, yams, plantains, sweet potatoes, tannias and dasheen were estimated at 19, 556,403 pounds available for local consumption and export in the next six months. The Ministry, through the Division of Agriculture has propagated 100,010 vegetable seedlings of its 300,000 quota to supply to 1400 applicants as part of its food security initiative.
- *****The IMF Executive Board approves three requests from Dominica, Grenada, and St. Lucia for emergency financial assistance to help address the challenges posed by COVID-19. The approval of the Board will make available a combined SDR 48 million (US\$65.6 million) in emergency financing to help these three countries deal with the challenges posed by COVID-19.

Before the ability to test on island, Grenada's samples were tested at the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) laboratory in Trinidad. Samples were sent using LIAT or the Regional Security Services aircraft. The samples took at least 48 hours to return. The PCR machines came to Grenada through a joint initiative of Canadian Bank Note and the National Lotteries Authority, while testing kits were donated by St George's University. The other collaborating agencies are the Pan American Health Organisation (PAHO), the Windward Islands Research and Education Institute (WINDREF) also at SGU, and CARPHA. • During March more than 300 kits were expected to come from 3 sources: a donation from the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) the new single regional public health agency for the Caribbean, the Chinese Government, and purchasing from a company which supplies the kits. • During March it was announced that Grenada has been in negotiation with Cuba for nurses and medical treatment. A Reuters report later reported that Cuba sent medical contingents to socialist allies Venezuela and Nicaragua as well as Jamaica, Suriname and Grenada. • *Grenada received its second shipment of medical supplies from China: donations were made both by the government and Alibaba. • *Within the UNDP COVID-19 response plan, the UNDP has committed to supporting the following initiatives for Grenada, which are ongoing or about to start implementation. - The Guyana Revenue Authority announced a number of tax relief measures:
 - Removal of VAT on Water and Electricity with effect from April 01, 2020 to June 30, 2020.
 - Removal of VAT on Domestic Air Travel with effect from April 08, 2020 to June 30, 2020.
 - Extension of the April 30th deadline for the filing of tax returns to June 30, 2020. However, estimated remaining taxes using “management financial statements”, for the Year of Income 2019 (Year of Assessment 2020) must be paid by April 30th, 2020.
 - The Authority will expedite the processing of VAT refunds for businesses and PAYE refunds for employees.
 - The waiver of VAT and duties on COVID 19 medical supplies and lab testing kits.
 - The granting of Tax deductions for all donations made by local businesses to staff and health institutions for the treatment of the virus.
 - The deferral of the payment of advance corporate and individual advance taxes for the Year of Assessment 2021 (Year of Income 2020) and PAYE for affected businesses until June 30, 2020. For example, airline and tourism and associated industries, like hotels and transportation, who continue to employ their employees, or send their employees on extended vacation leave, the payment of advance taxes will be deferred without penalty and interest.
 - Affected businesses will pay advance taxes on the current year basis.

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| <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • PAHO announced on March 6 that it would prioritize Haiti and Venezuela as “key countries” to support as Latin America works to manage increasing COVID-19 cases. Since then PAHO and the Prime Minister of Haiti have been working together to strengthen health system preparedness for COVID-19. PAHO provided 500 test kits for COVID-19 to the Ministry of Health, Haiti, along with a training on laboratory diagnosis and detection of the disease. • The Ministry of health has quarantine measures in effect but they are prioritizing home quarantine. The situation might change with the evolution of COVID-19. The Haitian Ministry of Health have set up isolation mechanisms for suspected patients while they are conducting the test for COVID-19. • The Ministry of Health has outlined a plan to combat the pandemic in Haiti, estimating a budget of \$37.2 million. Already, international and local organizations have been meeting to coordinate the response. • The Haitian Government thanked Cuba for its assistance to fight the pandemic of SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus, after eight Covid-19 cases were diagnosed in the country. The Henry Reeve Brigade that will support Haitian physicians to fight Covid-19 was awarded its flag at the Cuban Embassy in Haiti. The Minister recalled the 'traditional solidarity' and strong ties of friendship between Cuba and Haiti, which were strengthened during the cholera outbreak that killed 10,000 people, and later after Hurricane Matthew hit the country in 2016. •  The United States Government is providing a total of \$16.1 million to help Haiti respond to the COVID-19 outbreak. - The overnight policy rate remains unchanged at 0.5 percent, but Bank of Jamaica has taken additional actions to ensure uninterrupted system wide liquidity, with an estimated J\$57 billion liquidity injection to date, and removal of limits on the amounts that deposit taking institutions can borrow overnight without being charged a penalty rate and a broadening of the range of acceptable repo collateral. The authorities are also encouraging the banking sector to reschedule loans and mortgages, in addition to the mortgage rate cuts already announced by the National Housing Trust.
- The Bank of Jamaica has intervened in the FX market through limited sales of reserves, via the B-FXITT auction mechanism.
- *The Ministry of Education, Youth and Information continues to collaborate with Digicel Jamaica and Flow Jamaica to provide data plans for students and teachers in order to facilitate distance learning. The Government has extended online and distance learning for schools to July 3. Minister with oversight for Education, Youth and Information, Hon. Karl Samuda, said that schools will not physically reopen until the next school year on September 7, 2020. Additionally, the Government has entered into an arrangement with ReadyTV to provide a solution for 238 schools in remote areas that are currently without Internet access.
- *Private and corporate donors have committed over J\$40 million in the past two weeks to the Private Sector Organisation of Jamaica (PSOJ) COVID-19 Jamaica Response Fund. The fund seeks to tackle food insecurity and boost health services during the COVID-19 outbreak and will be coordinated by the Council of Voluntary Social Services, a key PSOJ partner.

The Government has waived the Special Consumption Tax on approximately 100,000 litres of alcohol for use in making (or substituting for) sanitizers that will be donated to the National Health Fund and Ministry of Health. They have also waived Customs Duty on the importation of masks, gloves, hand sanitizers and liquid hand soap for a 90-day period. Under normal circumstances, Customs requires BPO firms to keep the equipment used in their operations physically at their place of business. This requirement is waived for a specific period to facilitate working from home and for business continuity.

Government Senator Don Wehby has called for the suspension of the importation of agricultural produce that is produced locally amid the economic squeeze farmers are now having to bear because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- On April 1, the Montserrat government announced a broad set of fiscal and financial measures, including (i) increasing the tax threshold, and a deferral of all business related taxes, (ii) providing financial support to vulnerable tourism sector employees, (iii) providing EC\$900 (US\$ 333) per month in benefit support to unemployed persons, (iv) providing additional food packages and food delivery to low income groups and (v) providing financial support to the agricultural sector to enhance food security.
*On April 8, the government announced that it would receive an additional US\$ 3.1million in financial aid from the UK government to fund COVID-19 measures.

- The economic plan outlines 4 main areas of support, notably support to workers, support to businesses, general support, and agricultural support (note all figures below are quoted in EC Dollars)

SUPPORT TO WORKERS:

- Increase the tax threshold by \$5,000, to \$20,000 from January 1, 2020. The new tax bands will be:
 - i. Annual Income of \$0.00 to \$20,000- attract 0% tax
 - ii. Amounts over \$20,001 and between \$25,000- attracts 10% tax
 - iii. Amounts over \$25,001 and between \$30,000 – attracts 20% tax
 - iv. Amounts over \$30,001 and between \$150,000 attracts 30%
 - v. Amounts over \$150,001- attracts 40% Tax
- Direct financial support to employees in the Tourism sector; including hotels, tour operators, restaurants, and transportation services. Government will pay at least 80% of salaries up to a maximum amount of \$3,200 per month (equivalent to 80% of a \$4,000 salary).
- Provide Covid-19 Benefit Support – to provide \$900 a month (food package and cash support) to persons who do not have any work and unable to access other Social Security benefits and other financial support.
- Social Services to provide additional food package top up for vulnerable low income earners and other low income groups.
- Additional support will be provided to the Social Security Fund as required. The Social Security is an important protection system for our island and Government stands by and fully supports the Fund.

SUPPORT TO BUSINESSES:

- Deferral (postponement) of all business related taxes (Accrued and Current) for all businesses. This support will be for an initial period of 3 months, and may be extended subject to further review.
- Deadline extension for the annual returns for businesses to the Financial Services Commission by three months, and no penalty charges will apply during this period.

GENERAL SUPPORT

- Cash injections will be provided to fund a grocery delivery service. This aims to cover the additional fuel, equipment and PPE costs to provide this essential service. This will be done in conjunction with

 - Removal of VAT and Import Duty for six months on the following additional hygiene items: hand sanitizers, hand sanitizer dispensing machine, disinfecting wipes, rubbing alcohol, gloves, masks, protective gowns and the Removal of Import Duty and Customs Service Charge for six months on the following: Vegetables, Fruits, Fruit Juices, Cough and Cold Preparations, Vitamins (3 million).
 - Waiver of payments for consumption of water for the period April to June 2020 for individuals who have been laid off by businesses or experience a reduction in earnings as a consequence of COVID-19 (Cost Unknown).
 - Reduction of the Corporate Income Tax rate from 33 percent to 25 percent for the period April to June 2020for businesses that retain at least 75 percent of their employees (\$4.8 million)
 - Reduction of the Unincorporated Business Tax rate by 50 percent from 4.0 percent to 2.0 percent for the period April to June 2020(\$1.0 million)
 - Injection of \$10 million to boost production in the Agriculture Sector and ensure greater food security for the Federation.
 - Waiver of payments for the consumption of water by farmers for six months (April to September 2020) (Cost Unknown)
 - Provision of an additional \$5 million to support the Poverty Alleviation Programme.
 - Employees who contract the virus and for whom contributions were made would be eligible for Social Security benefits. The Social Security Board will establish a special fund withabout\$10 million -\$15 million to assist with income support of up to \$1,000 per month for workers whose income would have been impacted by COVID-19. Registered self-employed persons who can show that they have been impacted would also qualify for this support.

entities are all encouraged to use the Inland Revenue Department's Electronic Filing Platform to file their tax returns and make payments online, as it is a convenient, safe and reliable medium. This will also facilitate greater adherence to the social distancing protocols currently in place.

- The waiver of interest and penalties on all tax types administered by the Inland Revenue Department due in the month of March, 2020. Similarly, all payment due dates for the months of April to September 2020 will be extended by one month (for example, Value Added Tax (VAT) payments due on April 21st 2020 will now be due on May 21st 2020; Personal Income Tax payment due on March 31, 2020 will now be due on April 30, 2020).

- Barrel Concessions - As part of the Government's response to the impact of this pandemic, the annual duty-free barrel trade will take effect much earlier than normal and start in June to allow people sufficient time to receive much needed items from family members and friends abroad.

SME Measures

- The suspension of all rent payments for six (6) months for vendors and operators of hospitality operations, including restaurants, which are accommodated in units owned by the government, for SMMEs with can demonstrate loss of business.
- Provide direct support to local indigenous farmers to support increased productivity and inputs to supply the local and regional markets.
- Provide relief to minibus operators through the payment of \$1.1 million in fuel rebate.
- Provide targeted support to farmers and fishermen adversely affected through the purchase of products from farmers and fishers. On this note, I would like to encourage fishermen to participate in the COAST insurance facility in light of the impending hurricane season. In light of the difficulties experienced by Winfresh, today, the Government injected one million dollars into National Farmers Trading Organization (NFTO) on behalf of Winfresh with another payment of one million to follow soon.
- The government is considering special concessions to entities which are producing sanitation products and health care products such as face masks. The government will

- On April 7, the government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines approved a fiscal package (4 percent of GDP) in response to the pandemic crisis. The main measures include: (i) increased health spending, (ii) waiving of VAT and duties on health and hygiene products, (iii) relief to the hardest-hit sectors (i.e. tourism, transport, and agriculture), (ii) expansion of social safety net programs, and (iv) deferred payment of personal income taxes and various license fees.
- Economic stimulus of just over \$74 million was announced to help deal with the fallout. The bulk of revenue for the package will come from six sources — the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the contingency fund of the Government of St Vincent and the Grenadines, the United Arab Emirates (UAE), the Bank of St Vincent and the Grenadines, other financial institutions and bondholders. Additional support will also come from the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank (ECCB), the National Insurance Services (NIS), the SVG Port Authority, the Agricultural Input Warehouse, and the Eastern Caribbean Group of Companies. The breakdown is below:
 - \$10 million of the economic recovery and stimulus plan will be spent on COVID-19 health initiatives.
 - Funds will also be used for the immediate generation of jobs in public works through specifically-funded roads and buildings programmes, other physical facilities, the second phase of PAVE and painting some of the government buildings. This will amount to \$30 million.
 - Direct support to the tune of \$9 million will also be offered in areas of farming, animal husbandry, and fishing. There will also be \$3 million worth of support will also be given to the arrowroot industry.
 - Five million dollars will be used to provide social supports for vulnerable and affected persons while \$1 million will be used for additional resources for grants under the Promotion of Youth Micro-Enterprises (PRYME).
 - Four million dollars — \$2 million each — will be used to provide additional support to the Argyle International Airport for five months as well as additional support for small businesses in the field of culture and arts.
 - Additional support to the tune of \$1 million will also be given to SVG Tourism Authority.
 - \$700,000 will be used to procure a medical evacuation vessel and another \$350,000 will be spent on communication expenses.
 - Additional are the tax relief and other measures which are estimated to cost the revenue approximately \$10 million. These include: a waiver of duty and VAT on bleach, disinfectants, liquid hand soap, hand sanitisers, rubbing alcohol, hydrogen peroxide, soap dispensers, bath soap, toilet paper, paper towels, glycerin, hydrogen peroxide, acetaminophen and oral rehydrating salts. | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The fiscal package of March 23 includes (i) salaries for up to 3 months for temporarily unemployed workers; (ii) VAT and income tax refunds to individuals and SMEs; (iii) liquidity support to individuals and small businesses via credit union loans at reduced interest rates and long repayment periods; (iv) grants to hoteliers to upgrade of their facilities; and (v) other social support measures for low-income vulnerable groups. On March 26, the Prime Minister announced that the Ministry of Health will receive additional funding to deal with COVID-19, including spending on medical equipment and supplies, human resources, and infrastructure. On March 17, the central bank reduced the policy rate by 150 bps to 3.5 percent, and the reserve requirement on commercial bank deposits by 300 bps to 14 percent. As a result, commercial banks have reduced the average prime lending rate to 7½ percent as of April 2, from 9¼ percent previously. Additionally, commercial banks agreed to provide a 1-month moratorium on mortgage loan and instalment loan payments, without any penalty; and to waive penalty interest on overdraft facilities. Several banks have already started to offer automatic deferrals for a period of up to 6 months on loans or credit card payments due. Other government housing institutions will provide similar relief to their customers with 2 to 6 months' payment deferrals. Money lenders have been asked to arrange deferred payments and interest rate reductions for their members. Interest rates on credit cards will be reduced by 10 to 17 percentage points of the existing rates, on a bank by bank basis. The government will increase the allocation of foreign exchange in the system, using Exim Bank and other institutions to ensure uninterrupted supply of basic items such as food and pharmaceuticals. Trinidad unveils \$1b COVID-19 stimulus package. Included within the package is the Salary Relief Grant where citizens of this county who lose their jobs as a result of the measures being put in place to curb the spread of COVID-19 will be able to access \ \$1,500 a month for the next three months. Other measures were also outlined. *CAF -Development Bank of Latin America- approved a USD 50 million loan to mitigate the Covid-19 health crisis in Trinidad and Tobago. - ***Included in Trinidad & Tobago's government and institution measures in response to COVID-19 are:**
 - **Employment-related measures:** Covering 75% of the salary of employees sent into technical unemployment by companies affected by the coronavirus crisis.

 - **Economic stimulus measures:**
 - The Trinidad and Tobago Mortgage Finance and Home Mortgage Bank to begin payment deferrals for three months in the first instance.

 - The Government has asked the Housing Development Corporation and The Trinidad and Tobago Mortgage Finance Company Ltd. to defer rental and mortgage payments for one month in the first instance.

 - Interest rates on credit cards will be reduced by amounts ranging from 10% to 17% of the existing rates, on a bank by bank basis. This means that First Citizens Bank, for example, has agreed to reduce its credit card interest rate from 24% to 20% and Republic Bank will reduce its interest rate from 24% to 21%, and so on. It should be noted that this position on credit card interest rates was erroneously communicated in the discussions held over the last two days, where it was communicated in error that rates would be reduced by 10 percentage points to 14%. The banks have also been requested to make further reductions in credit card interest rates for small businesses and affected individuals.

 - The Central Bank announced a reduction in the reserve requirement for the commercial banks from 17% to 14% and a reduction in the repo rate by 150 basis points from 5.0% to 3.5%. These actions will inject an additional \$2.6 billion in increased liquidity into the commercial banking system and as a result, we have been advised by the commercial banks that this should cause an immediate reduction in the prime lending rate of 1.5 percentage points to 7.75%.


 - The commercial banks drop their prime lending rates further to 6% and to reduce the spread between lending rates and deposit rates.

 - The commercial banks have agreed to provide a one-month moratorium (skip a payment) on mortgage loan and instalment loan payments, without any penalty and to waive penalty interest on overdraft facilities.

 - The allocation of Foreign Exchange to be increased for the purchase of essential items such as pharmaceuticals and basic food items.

 - Government will provide \$50 million as part of a grant facility for Tobago hoteliers to upgrade their premises. Government will also

During this meeting, representatives from regional institutions provided updates to the Ministers and Officials in relation to COVID-19. Among the updates The Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) stated that they have experienced delays in receiving reagents for COVID-19 tests. Additionally, the CARPHA Medical Microbiology Laboratory (CMML) which currently conducts tests for suspected COVID-19 cases for several CARICOM Member States, highlighted that, like all laboratories world-wide, it was being impacted by global shortage of test kits for the COVID-19 tests as well as re-agents (chemicals used in testing) and protection equipment, which could have an impact on its operations if they are not received within the next 2 weeks. CARPHA assured the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Health Ministers that along with the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), it was working to address the procurement of the necessary materials and equipment to avert any shortages as a result of the delay and cancellation of orders made repeatedly since January.

The Executive Board of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) approved disbursements to Dominica, Grenada, and St. Lucia following their requests under the Rapid Credit Facility (RCF) mechanism, with a combined SDR 48 million (US\$65.6 million), to help cover their balance of payment needs stemming from the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Disbursements to all three countries are set at the maximum available access under the RCF instrument of 100 percent of quota for Grenada (SDR 16.4 million or US\$ 22.4 million) and St. Lucia (SDR 21.4 million or US\$ 29.2 million), and 89.4 percent of quota for Dominica (SDR 10.3 million or US\$14 million). These countries are small states that are very vulnerable to shocks, including large natural disasters, with Dominica in particular still recovering from the devastation of Hurricane Maria in 2017.

- **Coordinating the distribution of Direct Relief donations to other OECS Member States**

On March 14, 2020 staff members of the OECS Pharmaceutical Procurement Services and the OECS Facilities Unit coordinated the reception, repacking and distribution of multiple equipment donated by Direct Relief to support the response to the COVID-19 threat in the OECS Member states. The donated items included personal protect equipment (PPE), N95 masks, gloves, and hurricane preparedness backpacks (HPPs) among others.

- **Cooperating with International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA)**

The OECS is working in close collaboration with IAEA to support the accessibility of Member States to diagnostic equipment and tests in line with the recommendations of the World Health Organisation (WHO).

- **OECS secures support from Cuba**

Health practitioners in the OECS will benefit from training and support for care and management from the Cuban authorities to strengthen the local response to the COVID-19 threat.

- **OECS secures USD 20,000 donation from Sagicor**

Following a presentation on the assessment of medical equipment needed in the OECS region, supported by a financial pre-assessment, both parties agreed on a USD 20,000 donation from Sagicor. The donation represents 50% of the regional need and will facilitate the purchase of infrared thermometers and the screening of people infected by the COVID-19.

- **OECS collaborates with Facebook and CARPHA to provide a coordinated Regional communications response**

The OECS, CARPHA, and Facebook have agreed to mobilise efforts towards ensuring the dissemination of reliable messaging on the response to COVID-19 in the region through the use of the Facebook social media platform.

OECS Education Sector Response Strategy to COVID-19

Decision makers and key players in the area of education in the Eastern Caribbean held the first session of a series of virtual meetings on March 17, 2020 to discuss a Regional Education Sector's Response Plan to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the main, the participants agreed to take measures as follows: transitioning schools to online learning and ensuring the access of teachers and students to the necessary equipment, infrastructure and technologies; exploring Public Private Partnerships to ensure the strengthening of necessary systems for virtual learning; envisioning the best options to facilitate pending regional and national student assessments and exams; exploring the possible repatriation of students stationed at dorms across the campuses of the University of the West Indies (UWI) which closed after the COVID-19 outbreak; and seeking alternative arrangements through the locations of UWI Open Campuses in the OECS Member States to facilitate tertiary level exams.

Eastern Caribbean Currency Union Monetary Policy Response

On March 19, the Monetary Council of the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank (ECCB) approved grant funding to the ECCB Member Governments, totalling EC\$4 million (EC\$500,000 each), to help in their fight against the COVID-19. On March 20, the ECCB and ECCU Bankers Association announced a support program for customers and residents during this time of difficulty and uncertainty. The program includes: (i) a loan repayment moratorium for an initial period up to 6-months, with a possible extension upon review; and (ii) waiver of late fees and charges to eligible customers during this period.

OECS Strengthens Preparedness for COVID-19 Through Partnership
